

The Registered Safety Supplier Scheme



Foreword

As we all know, using personal protective equipment (PPE) is often the most practical & proportionate way to ensure worker safety and health.

If the outcome of a risk assessment includes the necessity for PPE, it is a legal requirement that it must be adequate for the hazard and suitable for the wearer the task and the environment. So, the key question is, will the PPE perform as it claims?

PPE used at work must, by law carry the UKCA or CE mark identifying that the product has met minimum legal requirements for its design and that it also meets the basic requirements for health and safety. When a product claims performance against specific standards it is the law, that it must have been tested, approved and UKCA or CE marked against that specific product standard. For category III PPE (including products such as respiratory protective equipment and height safety equipment) there are further requirements for independent testing.

But how is the market policed in the UK? The Office for Product Safety and Standards (OPSS) a Directorate within the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) is responsible for market surveillance but since April 2018 the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) have been formally responsible for PPE products in the workplace with Trading Standards retaining a responsibility in the supply chain. Both Trading Standards and HSE are functions of government which have suffered continued reductions in resources over the years to the extent that we see no proactive market surveillance of PPE apart of course from the work of BSIF's Registered Safety Supplier Scheme.

The Registered Safety Supplier Scheme seeks to improve the quality of PPE and the capability of economic operators in the UK Occupational Health and Safety Market whilst eliminating unsafe, non-compliant and illegal safety products and services that will help to keep people safe and healthy while they are at work.

I commend it to you always look out for Registered Safety Supplier Scheme Shield.

What is the Registered Safety Supplier Scheme?

The BSIF has created the Registered Safety Supplier scheme (RSSS) to support the UK safety market. Companies displaying the scheme's logo have signed a binding declaration that the safety equipment and services they offer meet the appropriate standards, fully comply to the PPE regulations and are correctly UKCA/CE marked.

The Mission of the scheme is to provide assurance to users that only compliant and correctly performing products are being supplied through a capable, educated, competent supply chain. The scheme provides a recognized route to enable a member to demonstrate compliance and due diligence – discharging the obligations of an economic operator under Regulation 2016/425 on PPE as amended and brought into UK Law.

The RSSS is open only to members of the BSIF, and a mandatory requirement for all members engaged in PPE manufacturing, marketing and supply. New members to the BSIF will need to work towards achieving Registered Safety Supplier Scheme status within the first 6 Months of BSIF membership.

A Registered Safety Supplier Scheme member...

- Formally declares and commits to selling only Certified PPE and safety products that perform to claims made
- Ensures that they meet all the responsibilities of the Regulation 2016/425 on PPE as amended and brought into UK Law
- Submits their products to random independent performance testing
- Commits to having their customer facing staff educated and accredited in the Safe Supply Course
- Maintains a company Quality Policy
- Holds necessary authorisation for service provision
- As a Federation member trades honestly and ethically

Who benefits ...

- The purchasers and end users of safety products and PPE – with product that performs as it should
- The purchasers and users of safety products and PPE—sourced from capable, value adding suppliers

The obligations of a Registered Safety Supplier

BSIF members engaged in the supply of personal protective equipment and related products are required to participate in the Registered Safety Supplier Scheme by:

- Completing a formal, binding declaration that all products will comply with the requirements of applicable legislation and that any specific product performance claims are genuine.
- For PPE, submitting to the testing of one product per year (randomly selected from their offering) to indicative performance clauses to any standards for which certification is claimed. This audit will include all relevant documentation.
- Commitment to educate and accredit customer facing staff with the BSIF's publicly recognised OFQUAL Level 2 qualification: '*The Safe Supply Accreditation*'. (See page 8)
- For Distributors/Importers of PPE, demonstration that they comply with the "Obligations and Responsibilities" required by Regulation 2016/425 on PPE as amended and brought into UK Law.
- Having the capability to manage a product recall process and take other corrective actions and maintaining a quality management system.
- For Safety Equipment outside of mainstream PPE, not regulated by publicly available Standards, an audit of relevant documentation and assessment of claims will be made against one product or service.
- For organisations authorised by manufacturers to service, calibrate and or re-certify products, submitting to an audit of the manufacturers authorisation.
- Proof of adequate liability insurance.

Product Testing

Annually, or in the event of a complaint, the scheme will source on the open market one product from a registered member's PPE or relevant related product offering.



The product will be tested to one or more clauses of a standard which it is claimed that the product is certified to. Testing will be carried out by an accredited test laboratory (UKAS or equivalent) and the test laboratory will produce a test report of its findings. The auditor will request from the member copies of all relevant documents required to verify the UKCA/CE marking of the product concerned and any claims of certification to a product performance standard.

Where safety products or related services are not subject to publicly available standards said products can be tested through observation covering the product method sheets to confirm performance against claims made.



In the event of a product fail, the federation will contact the member to begin corrective measures and or satisfy that the product is withdrawn if needs be from the open market. Ultimately if the member refuses corrective action and communication they can be removed from the scheme and Trading Standards will be informed.

These requirements apply to all BSIF members marketing PPE, Safety Products & Safety Equipment, ensuring we collectively lead the industry and positively impact the safety of workers.


It is essential that the value and efficacy of the RSSS is understood up and down the supply chain.

BSIF looks to members to actively promote the benefits of the scheme to customers and suppliers alike.

Audit Processes

The BSIF does not set out to impose onerous audit and inspection procedures on applicants or companies within the scheme. However, for the scheme to maintain its credibility, it is essential that confidence in the fidelity of the information provided is gained through checks carried out by organisations which have no vested interests and therefore the Registered Safety Supplier Scheme will operate with an independent Governing Board.

Within the terms of the Registered Safety Supplier Scheme, the Governing Board's only interest is in insuring compliance with the scheme's requirements as they apply to the elimination of non-compliant or counterfeit and illegal products and services and the enhancement of economic operator's capabilities and their ability to comply with the PPE Regulations.



The scheme audit process will solely focus on these factors. For the avoidance of any doubt, working procedures, record keeping, staff activity and all of the other elements which are audited during ISO 9001 inspections fall outside the scope of any Registered Safety Supplier Scheme audit. The requirement in RSSS to show evidence of a suitable Product Recall process can fall into the scope of ISO 9001 as it is a management process that needs to be documented/followed/reviewed .

Products which carry the BSI Kitemark or other recognised similar independent accredited quality marks will not be further tested within the scheme.

Compliance Protocol To Regulation 2016/425 on PPE as amended and brought into UK Law

The PPE Regulations now stipulates that all economic Operators involved in the supply of PPE have clear legal responsibilities and obligations.

Economic operators are: Manufacturers, Importers, Distributors, Internet sellers and agents. BSIF can provide guidance as to which type of economic operator your organisation is, in line with the Regulation 2016/425 on PPE as amended and brought into UK Law. Once you are identified, you will be issued with Protocol or Checklist of your exact responsibilities and obligations, as outlined in the PPE Regulations.

This simple to follow checklist is to be kept electronically filed by each member, for each range of PPE sold. During each year of membership the federation will contact you to audit your company's protocol/checklist.

Ensuring correct understanding and adherence to the protocol will provide ongoing proof of your company's efforts to meet the new Regulation. This will help to satisfy Trading Standards and the HSE, who provide Market surveillance. These organisations back the scheme and have produced the following support statement:

Safe Supply Course and Accreditation





The new website for the RSSS scheme is designed to enable end users to understand, engage and utilise the scheme in a much easier and straight forward way. The site visitor will now have full access to the members of the scheme thanks to the Supplier search function and the supplier list page.

The supplier search function is designed so that a buyer of Safety Products/PPE can state their chosen location and a radius to this (from 5 miles up to 100 miles) and then click search. The results will then show all Registered Safety Suppliers within the chosen radius. This makes it easy for the purchaser to source their required product from the supplier directly. The search results also show contact details and the suppliers website meaning that their entire range of products is available to the user.

The supplier list page has individual sections for each member of the scheme and includes logo, company name and website, making it easy for users to find PPE.

Supporters of the scheme are encouraged to get involved and can benefit from declaring that as a purchaser of Safety Products/PPE they will source product, where possible, from RSSS members because they see the importance of using a reputable and compliant organisation. By aligning up as a supporter they benefit from having their company logo put on to the RSSS website to promote commitment to the scheme and the fact they are using best practice when it comes to purchasing Safety Products/PPE.
